Jack Johnson 1878-1946 First African American world heavyweight boxing champion.




DeFord Bailey 1899–1982 Harmonica player who was the first person to perform on the Grand Ole Opry stage and radio show.



Regina Benjamin 1956 18th Surgeon General of the United States.






George Washington Carver 1864-1943 Botanist whose research proved the benefits of crop rotation for both humans and depleted soil.

Malcolm X 1925–1965 Human rights activist who created the Organization of Afro-American Unity.




Jane Bolin 1908-2007 First African American woman to graduate from Yale Law School, and the first to serve as a judge in the United States.

Thurgood Marshall 1908–1993 Lawyer who won the landmark Brown v. Board of Education case and was the first African American on the Supreme Court.



Ella Fitzgerald 1917-1996 Singer who was the first African American to win a Grammy Award.



Jesse Jackson 1941 Clergyman and civil rights activist who founded PUSH and the Rainbow Coalition.



Blanche Bruce 1858-1931 First African American whose signature was represented on U.S. paper currency.



Nat "King" Cole 1919-1965 First African American to host a television variety show.



Hiram Rhodes Revels 1827 -1901 Clergyman who was the first African American Senator.



Maya Angelou 1928–2014 Author and poet who was the first African American woman to have a nonfiction work make the bestseller list.



Mary McLeod Bethune 1875-1955 Civil rights activist and educator who founded the National Council of Negro Women.



Alvin Ailey 1931–1989 Choreographer and founder of the world-famous Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater.



Booker T. Washington 1856–1915 Educator and reformer who was the first president of Tuskegee University.



Henry O. Flipper 1856 -1940 First African American graduate of West Point Academy and the first African American commander in the U.S Army.



Arthur Ashe 1960-1988 Professional tennis player who was the first African American to win the U.S. Open.



Jackie Robinson 1919 -1972 Baseball player who was the first African American Major League Baseball player of the modern era.



Madame C.J. Walker 1867-1919 First female self-made millionaire in America.



W.E.B. DuBois 1868-1963 Civil rights activist who was the first African American to graduate from Harvard and who helped found the NAACP.



Halle Berry 1966 First African American woman to win an Oscar for Best Actress in a Leading Role.



Henry Ossawa Tanner 1859-1937 First African American artist to have a painting enter the permanent collection of the White House.



Mari Copeny 2007 A youth activist and fundraiser whose work supports underprivileged children around the country.



Ben Carson 1951 Neurosurgeon who led the first successful operation to separate a pair of conjoined twin infants.



Shirley Chisholm 1924-2005 Educator and politician who was the first woman to run for the Democratic presidential nomination.



Adam Clayton Powell, Jr. 1908 –1972 Civil rights leader during the Depression and one of the first African American Congressmen.



1897-1993 Contralto singer who was the first African American to sing at the Metropolitan Opera House.



John Lewis 1940 U.S. Congressman and civil rights activist who was one of the original 13 Freedom Riders.



Coretta Scott King 1927-2006 Human rights activist who founded the Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change.



Barack Obama 1961 First African American to hold the office of President of the United States.



Ralph Bunche 1904–1971 Political scientist and diplomat who was the first African American to win the Nobel Peace Prize.



Aretha Franklin 1942-2018 Singer who was the first female artist inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.



Sojourner Truth 1797-1883 Abolitionist and women's rights activist who was one of the first African American women to win a lawsuit against a white man.



Mary Church Terrell 1863-1954 Activist and journalist who was the first African American woman to serve on a Board of Education.
